A Message from a Camp Sibling and Parent

Camp Goodtimes has been a big part of my life since I was 14 years old, then I was a camper there with my sister Kathryn who was 10. She had recently finished treatment for a medulloblastoma brain tumor. Being at camp gave us an opportunity to share with fellow campers the difficulties and joys that dealing with cancer can bring. It also gave us a chance to see the great lives people were living who had been through treatment. As a sibling Camp gave me a chance to meet other siblings of cancer patients. This gave me insight and a viewpoint of other siblings' struggles, something you don't get outside of camp. From then on Camp was always something that we looked forward to every year. In 2006 I was finally old enough to be on Camp staff, and since then Camp has been not only something I look forward to once a year, but in every part of the year because it has become a second family. In 2010 Kathryn was diagnosed after ten years cancer free with a Glioblastoma Multiforme Brain Tumor. Our Camp family was a huge support system for us through this until she passed away on February 2, 2012. They have continued to support our family till this day. Camp is a place that Kathryn and I loved as a team and there is nothing better than giving that experience back to other children and families.

I thought that Camp Goodtimes sounded like a great idea. The nurses encouraged me to sign the kids up right away. After just a few months of this horrible "new normal", I was ready for something to help out with morale. Aaron was preparing for his second surgery. Cambria was feeling like she was invisible. Jeremy and I were scared and tired. When we first found the tumor, our first instinct was to circle the wagons and start looking for silver linings. We tried to keep our days as positive and stress-free as possible, but even the funniest parents and bravest kids need a break once in a while. While we waited in line to check in, you would have thought the children were being abandoned at a work camp. They were miserable. We very nearly lost Aaron at the Gauntlet- he was horrified at the prospect of running down the middle of all those cheerful, jumping people. I thought I had made a terrible mistake.

A week later, we sat in the amphitheater watching the skits and introductions of all those wonderful campers, leaders, and staff. My children were smiling and happy! And not too embarrassed that I cried like a baby during the campers' heart-wrenching rendition of "One Day".

Cambria met siblings who understood the challenges of being invisible. Aaron finally got to be a regular kid again. Jeremy and I met other parents who needed no explanations. We all know what it is like to wait for results, and watch the sweet nurses walk our child out the back door to prep for surgery. Camp Goodtimes introduced us.

I feel like I cannot clearly express what the Camp experience has meant to my family. For one week a year, we all get to take a break from cancer. Jeremy and I get to relax, knowing that the amazing staff at Camp Goodtimes is taking good care of our children. The kids get a wacky week stuffed full of fun and joy. Each of us has made new, dear friends to play with and talk to outside of Camp. We all get recharged, and that is a beautiful gift.
